aughan and Russ Aaronson fell for this classic center-hall Colonial eight years ago, drawn to its large bay windows, brick facade and mature landscaping. Just one problem: The way the spaces were carved up inside the Richmond, Virginia, house was just a little bit too classic. "It was built in the 1950s," Vaughan says, "and it had a lot of walls and small, boxy rooms. So after living in it for five years we started thinking about how we could open it up."

Working with Tut Bartzen of Bartzen + Ball, the couple came up with a plan to reconfigure existing spaces and add 1,000 square feet to expand a galley kitchen and make way for a great room and large screen porch. Some spaces remained intact-and intimate-such as the living room, which is ready for formal entertaining.

The rest of the floor plan is designed to be enjoyed family-style. "The living in this house definitely happens in the kitchen and great room," Vaughan says. "And we like to leave those doors open onto the screened porch. We love
