Design a holiday theme that works with your existing decor by using unexpected colors and materials to create a sophisticated look.

Traditional red and green isn't for everyone. Richmond, Virginia, interior designer Susan Jamieson would have to agree. The 1925 Colonial Revival home where she and her husband, John, have lived for 16 years is decorated in a minimalist cream-and-ivory palette. So, during the holidays, she creates a glitzy holiday theme and glams it up with garland, ribbon, and ornaments in metallic tones that don't overwhelm the spare look.





## fresh idea 16

Play up the architecture of your home by accentuating features, like the stately columns flanking Susan and John's front porch, with spiraling garland and bright lights.

### fresh idea 17

Disguise unsightly wires from string lights by winding them around a column or post with greenery or garland and setting a pretty container of ornamental cabbage or kale at the base.

fresh idea 21

Pair preprinted gift tags that reinforce your color scheme with boxes wrapped in chocolate and metallic papers to add character under the tree.

### fresh idea 22

Transform a coffee table into a wrapped present by crisscrossing strands of ribbon over the top and sides for a giftlike effect. Silver family heirlooms add to the sparkly theme.

### fresh idea 23

Use spray paint to add a shimmery accent to pinecones, acorns, or round glass ornaments. Displayed en masse in tall glass vases, they become instant and easy holiday accents.

### fresh idea 24

Create a unified and sophisticated alternative to mismatched ornaments with glittering balls and stars in various finishes.

### fresh idea 25

Drape garland up the handrail of a staircase, and anchor it with gold bows for a holiday welcome in the fover.

# fresh idea 26

Forgo the traditional single wreath on a front door and welcome guests instead with three miniature wreaths. Attached to a long piece of ribbon, the smaller wreaths are ideal for a glass-front door.
